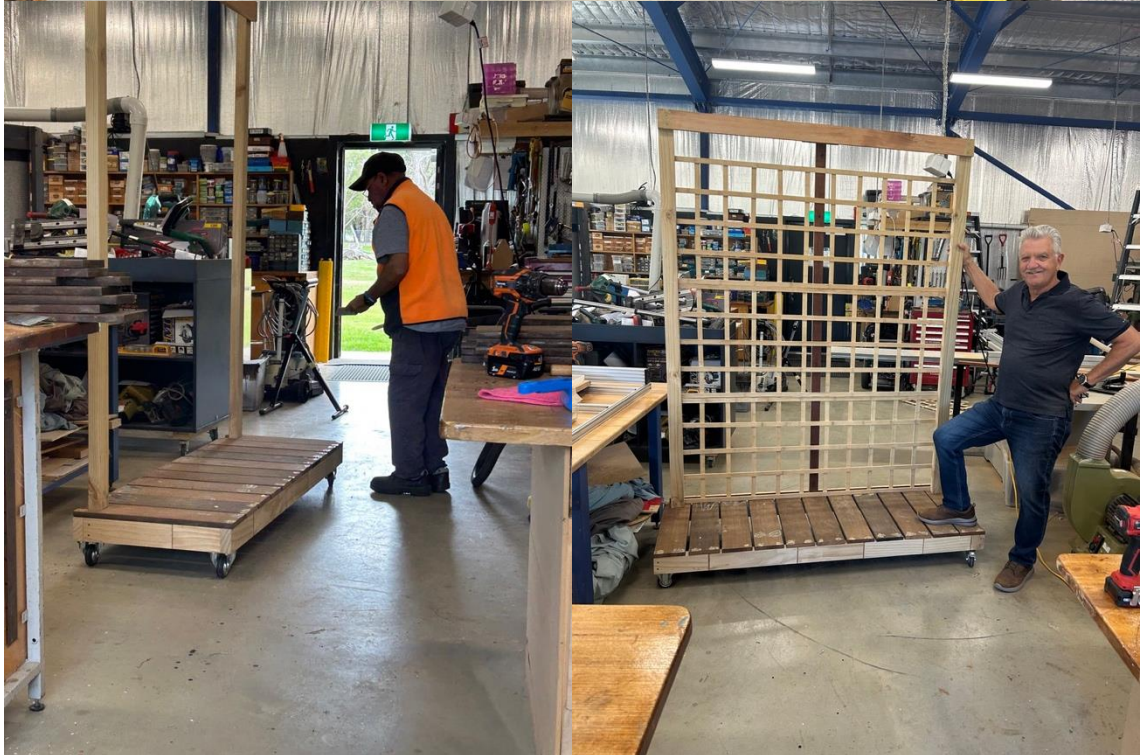

The Ode of Remembrance and where it came from

The Ode of Remembrance is an extract from a longer poem.

The Australian Army, on its website, states: "The Ode comes from For the Fallen, a poem by English poet and writer Laurence Binyon. The poem was first published in The Times on 21 September 1914. It was later published in the Wino-nowing Fan - Poems of the Great War.

"By mid-September 1914, less than seven weeks after the outbreak of war, the British Expe-ditionary Force in France had already suffered se-vere casualties. Long lists of the dead and wound-ed appeared in British newspapers. It was against this background that Binyon wrote For the Fallen.

"The Ode is the fourth stanza of the poem. The verse, which became the League Ode, was already used in association with Anzac Day com-memoration services in Australia in 1921."

For the Fallen

With proud thanksgiving, a mother for her children
England mourns for her dead across the sea,
Flesh of her flesh they were, spirit of her spirit,
Fallen in the cause of the free.
Solemn the drums thrill: Death august and royal
Sings sorrow up into immortal spheres,
There is music in the midst of desolation
And glory that shines upon our tears.
They went with songs to the battle, they were

young,
Straight of limb, true of eyes, steady and aglow,
They were staunch to the end against odds un-
counted,
They fell with their faces to the foe.
They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow
old;
Age shall not weary them, nor the years con-
demn
At the going down of the sun and in the morn-
ing
We will remember them.
They mingle not with their laughing comrades
again,
They sit no more at familiar tables of home,
They have no lot in our labour of the daytime,
They sleep beyond England's foam,
But where our desires and hopes profound,
Felt as a well-spring that is hidden from sight,
To the innermost heart of their own land they
are known
As the stars are known to the night.
As the stars shall be bright when we are dust,
Moving in marches upon the heavenly plain,
As the stars that are starry in the time of our
darkness,
To the end, to the end, they remain.
