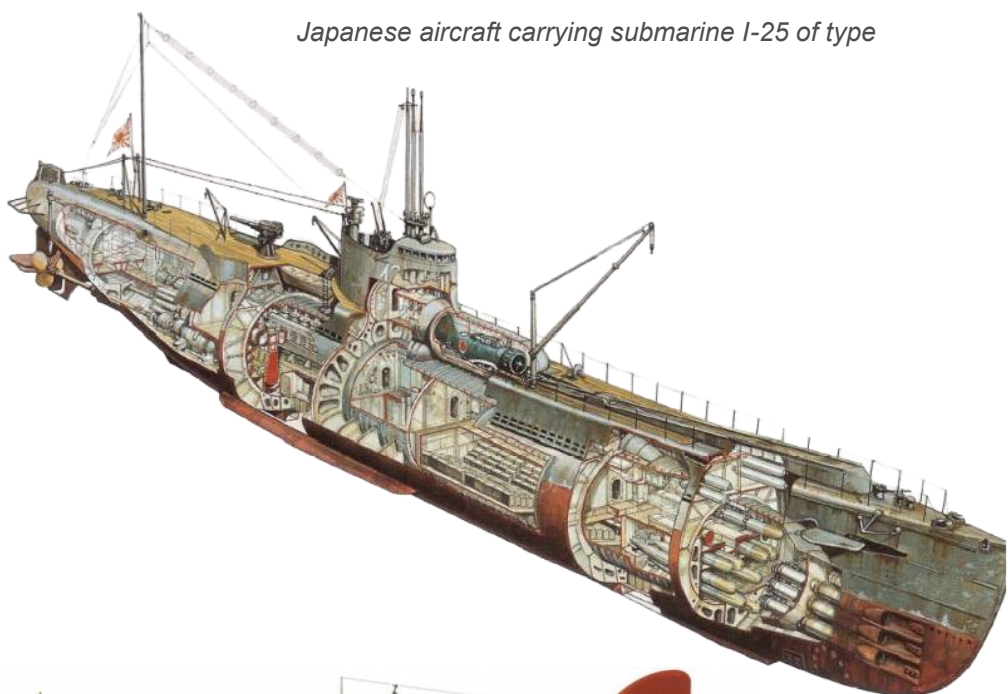
# When WWII flew over Melbourne



On 26 February 1942, the Japanese submarine *I-25*, under the command of Captain Akiji Tagami, was off the northern tip of King Island in Bass Strait off the coast of Victoria, Australia, when an E14Y was launched on a reconnaissance flight over the Port of Melbourne.<sup>[1]</sup> The pilot and observer/gunner were in the air for three hours, during which time they successfully flew over Port Phillip Bay and observed the ships at anchor off Melbourne before returning to land on its floats beside the submarine, where it was winched aboard and disassembled.

The E14Y is the only Japanese aircraft to overfly New Zealand during World War II (and only the second enemy aircraft after the German Friedrichshafen FF.33 'Wölfchen' during World War I). On 8 March 1942, Warrant Officer Nobuo Fujita photographed the Allied build-up in Wellington harbour in a "Glen" launched from the Japanese submarine *I-25*. On 13 March, he flew over Auckland, before the *I-25* proceeded to Australia. On the night of 24/25 May, Warrant Officer Susumo Ito flew a "Glen" over Auckland from the Japanese submarine *I-21*. Just days later, in the same aircraft, Ito flew the reconnaissance flight preceding the sole Japanese attack on Sydney Harbour in which twenty-one seamen were killed when HMAS *Kuttabul* sank on 1 June 1942.<sup>[1]</sup>

# Easter Reflections



Like Christmas, Easter has different meanings for both the faithful and the secular. Sea food, hot crossed buns and Easter eggs are all parts of this religious celebration that are shared by the community at large. For the faithful, Good Friday is the holiest day on the Christian Calendar. The day commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus Christ around 29AD. Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of Jesus. To Christians, Jesus remained in the tomb until the third day and to fulfil prophecy, He was raised from the grave as the first human of a new creation.

The term Easter is actually a pagan term from Celtic tradition, this is why some Christian denominations prefer the term "Resurrection Sunday". Easter Sunday comes at the end of a period called Lent or the Lenten Fast. This is a period that some, not all, Christian denominations observe a period of six weeks where a luxury, a favorite food or past time is abstained from in recognition of Christ's sacrifice. In medieval times, catholic Christians would abstain from eating eggs over this time. They waited until Easter Sunday to eat eggs, hence Easter Eggs. Over the period the eggs were decorated. Easter eggs are also called Paschal Eggs. In the 20th century, chocolate eggs replaced hen laid eggs and colored foil replaced paint for decoration.

The egg is used for symbolism in a number of aspects of Christianity. The structure of shell, white and yoke forming one egg is seen as symbolic of the Holy Trinity. The chick breaking out of the shell at birth, was seen as symbolizing resurrection from the tomb, hence chicks as one of the symbols of Easter. Chicks were also a symbol of fertility.

Decorations of eggs has also become elaborate with jeweled decoration eggs. These are highly prized and expensive. Easter Egg hunts is also a tradition many families celebrate at this time of year.

Hot Crossed buns were traditionally eaten on Good Friday with the Cross decoration commemorating the crucifixion of Jesus, but over recent decades, seem to be eaten from Boxing Day onwards. The tradition recipe having to compete with weird and wonderful variations. Even a Doritos flavor, I think I will pass on that one.

Traditionally, the Thursday before Easter is Holy Thursday, tradition also has this as the day of the Last Super commemoration. This coincided with the Passover meal at the time of Jesus and the symbolism was used by the Gospel writers. The hour of Jesus's death was according to the Gospels was the ninth hour, 03:00 pm in our terms. Normally crucifixion victims were simply dumped in the local tip or left to the birds and wild animals to eat. The Gospels depart from the normal course by having Jesus's body anointed with oils and spices, wrapped in linen and placed in a tomb, this was very unusual for a person executed by crucifixion.

Another unusual aspect of this story is the short time it took for Jesus to die. In ancient times people could take up to two weeks to die on a cross. The Gospels say that the other two victims with Jesus had their legs broken. This was a practice to speed up death by Asphyxiation, it was not done to Jesus as he was already dead by sunset. Most medical people now believe, given the Gospel accounts, that Jesus died from a heart aneurysm, due to the falls with the heavy cross causing bruising of the heart tissue. According to medical experts, this would have caused the chest cavity to fill with blood, so effectively Jesus bled to death internally. This would align with the Gospel description of the blood plasma and lymphatic fluid separating, the blood and water pouring from the spear wound in Jesus side.

One question that has puzzled historians since the event is that Pontius Pilate, through his term as Roman Governor of Judea, was a tough, by the book character. So why did he allow himself to be forced to have Jesus condemned, even though he believed that Jesus was innocent in the eyes both the Roman and Jewish law. Pilate was an associate of the Praetorian Guard, a one Lucius Aelius Sejanus. Sejanus had become implicated in a planned military coup to remove the then emperor Tiberius. Tiberius became aware of the plot and had Sejanus, with his family, executed. The Gospels say that when Pilate asked "What will I do with Jesus the King of the Jews?" the chief priest and elders answered that they have no king except Ceasar. This may have been a reference to the Sejanus scandal at a time when Pilate was quite vulnerable. So you may see Jesus as being a victim of political conspiracies and jealousies.

The Gospels narrative shifts to the Sunday or first day of the week. Realizing that Jesus had prophesized that he would rise from the dead on the third day after His crucifixion, according to the Gospels, the Chief Priests had convinced Pilate to station a guard at the tomb and put a seal on the tomb. This was to prevent Jesus's followers from stealing His body and claiming He had risen.

What occurred on the Sunday Morning has caused debates for two millennia. All accounts agree that by the end of the Third Day, the Tomb was empty and the body could not be located. To believers like myself, this was simply because Jesus was resurrected and walked out of the Tomb. This actually answers all the questions of why the Tomb was empty, why the authorities could not locate a body, did not arrest, interrogate, torture the information from Jesus's followers. The fact that a highly trained Roman Guard had been overpowered and a seven ton stone tossed out of the way adds to this. However what you believe occurred on the Sunday is for your own personal reflection.

But for all, both the religious and secular, Easter has a message of hope in the darkest despair. One great Afro American Peacher had as his catch phrase "Today maybe Friday, but Sunday is coming!". The concept of love that the Christians brought to the first century world was such a radical departure from the then accepted thinking on love, that the Greeks had to create a new word for it, Agape, to describe this concept of unconditional love for all.

Even for secular people, this gives an opportunity to support charities like the Good Friday RCH appeal and spend time with friends, family. Thinking about what you can do to make your world a better more compassionate one.

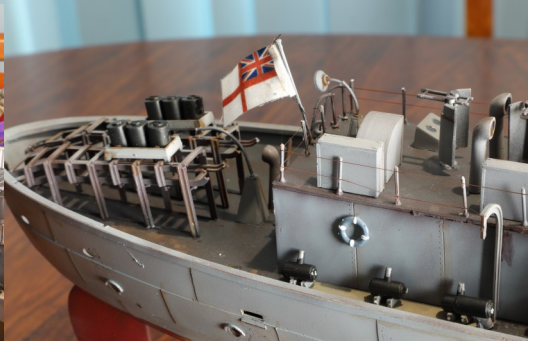

The model was originally designed and produced by the iconic British brand Matchbox, then latter by Revell. In Canada, it reached No. 1 on the RPM national singles chart for the first time on April 8, 1972, on which date Young held the top spot on both the singles and albums charts, and No. 1 again on May 13. *Billboard* ranked it as the No. 17 song for 1972.

In 2004, *Rolling Stone* ranked it No. 297 on their list of the 500 greatest songs of all time, No. 303 in an updated 2010 list, and No. 259 in 2021.

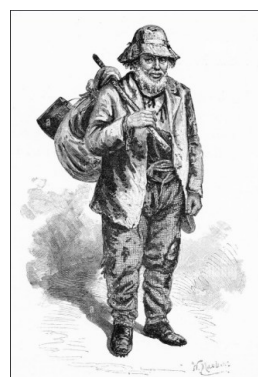

# ANZAC Day Reflection

## ANZAC DAY REFLECTION

### My Father's War



My father Clifford Anthony Wragg (Ragg originally) was born on the 6th of March, 1924 at Lakemba, New South Wales. A good rugby player and student, life took a downward turn when my grandmother died suddenly when he was only eight. My grandfather, who was second engineer on the RMS Niagara, was unable to look after his children, due to long stints at sea, so my father's care was entrusted to relatives, who at times were abusive.

Tragedy again struck in 1940 when my grandfather died in Sydney from Pneumonia. At 17 years of age, my father, Aunty Winnie and Uncle Bruce found themselves on the streets of Melbourne homeless. The solution was to attend the Armed Services Recruiting office and lie about their age. Winnie put her age as 23, my father 22 and Bruce 21. Bruce was in fact only 15 and my father 17 in 1941. Winnie was recruited into the RAAF and trained as a radar operator. Bruce and my father were recruited into the Army. Suspecting Bruce was just a boy, they assigned him to a job in stores that would keep away from combat and relatively safe from danger.

My father had no such luck. He became part of the Royal Australian Engineers and was seconded to the famous Ninth Division.

Sailing to the Middle East in 1941, on the Queen Mary, he was in charge of the Bridge Bar and ran the onboard casino. Beer tokens were used as currency and by the time they had reached Alexandria, he owned all the beer tokens on board.

He served two weeks during the siege of Tobruk and then against Axis forces in Syria. His most poignant memories are of the battle of El Alamein in September 1942. As a sapper, he was part of the team that cleared the 1.5 kilometer mine field, to allow the Australian Ninth Division to mount a diversionary attack at Kidney Ridge. This attack was so intense that Rommel mistook it for the main attack and concentrating his forces against it, thereby making a blunder that cost him the battle and Germany the North Africa Campaign.

With the threat to Australia itself, my father returned to Sydney. After a brief respite, he was sent again into action against the Japanese in the landings at Lae, New Guinea. His duties included building a pontoon bridge while under fire from a sniper. A bullet passed within a centimeter of his head. He later said that he just had to keep working while he hoped the combat troops would get the sniper, before the sniper got him. Fortunately the combat troops did get the sniper. He also survived a barrage of 14 inch Naval gunfire. However he was critically wounded by a Japanese grenade and evacuated to Port Moresby.

He spent many months recovering from this and lost the use of one lung for the rest of his life. So in 1944, the Army decided he had done his bit and gave him an Honorable Discharge on Medical Grounds.

The end of the War did not bring an end to the suffering from the effects of his injuries. Physical damage to his lungs and Post Traumatic Stress were issues he had to deal with in the post war years. His medical and dental needs were taken care of by the Commonwealth through the Repatriation Department.

When he passed away in September 2004, his coffin was flag draped, his medals displayed on it and the Last Post played at the end of the service.

He never harbored any grudges against his former enemies. He said they were doing their duty as he was. On meeting a former member of the Africa Corps while on holiday in Munich, the two became life long friends. He also defended a young Japanese couple when they were insulted by some yobos. He asked them where they were when he was fighting in New Guinea.

He called war the greatest stupidity known to man. The effect of war made him long for a peaceful life for his children. He couldn't stand war movies as he said most didn't portray the reality of war.

People like my father are the ones we stand for on ANZAC day, the ones who laid down their lives, the ones who suffered injuries and the ones who were prepared to do so in the armed services, emergency services, Police and medical services. ANZAC day is a day to remember the cost of the democratic freedoms we now enjoy.

The basic roles of the sub-committee are:

## **Core Financial Oversight**

## **Funding and Sustainability**

- Organising fund-raising initiatives.
- Consider partnerships, maybe sponsorships, donations of materials, etc.

## **Governance & Compliance**

- Reviewing and renewing insurance annually.
- Verifying the books and ensuring we are ready for the annual audit.

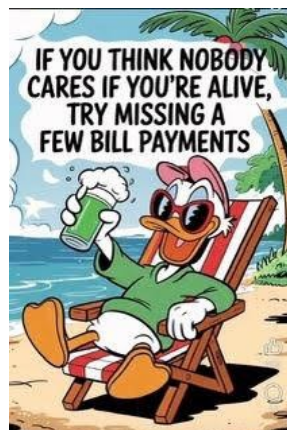
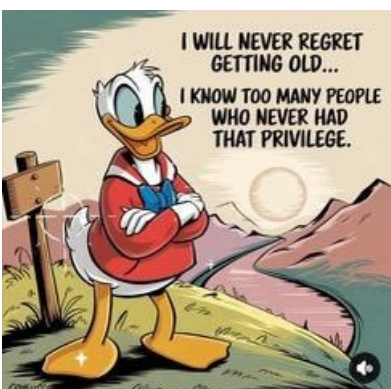
