Historic Events that occurred in July

- **July 1, 1867:** The British North America Act took effect, creating the Dominion of Canada and establishing its independence from the United Kingdom.
- **July 4, 1776:** The Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, declaring the 13 American colonies separate from Great Britain.
- **July 14, 1789:** The French Revolution began when revolutionaries stormed the Bastille, a symbol of royal tyranny in Paris.
- **July 16, 1969:** The Apollo 11 mission launched, carrying the first humans to land on the Moon. Four days later, on July 20, Neil Armstrong became the first person to walk on the lunar surface.
- **July 20, 1944:** A group of German military officers led by Claus von Stauffenberg launched the 20 July Plot, a failed attempt to assassinate Adolf Hitler.
- **July 31, 1997:** J.K. Rowling published the first book in her highly successful fantasy series, *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, launching a global cultural phenomenon

President's Perspective

At the last committee meeting a policy was approved for selection of candidates for the award of Life Member. A copy was displayed outside our office on the window for all to read.

What is a policy? And how is it different from a rule of an organization?

A policy is approved by the committee and implemented for the best purposes of the association (ie, our shed). A policy has to be mindful of rules which may exist and have bearing on a policy. Rules are often “handed down” by governing organizations or laws proclaimed by the three levels of government.

For example our shed is an independent association of members and is not subject to an over-arching body who sets rules. VMSA (Victorian Men's Shed Association) and AMSA (Australian Men's Shed Association) are advisory bodies to individual sheds – not setters of procedures or rules. Some service organizations have a tiered hierarchy of authority and may have set rules from a central position, possibly even overseas in the founding country. Men's Sheds stand alone. Therefore it is important that individual sheds have policies to properly (and legally) cover the needs of the members.

However all sheds are required to comply with the rules of our society as proclaimed by our law makers at all levels of government. We are not exempt from all appropriate laws and rules: Council By-Laws, Workcover/Safety, Discrimination, Bullying, etc.

Our policies must reflect all the legal issues and yet provide guidance for the common sense operation of our shed. Policies can be modified, amended or deleted at subsequent committee meetings unlike rules which require approval from external sources.

Policies are not included in our registered Rules lodged with the department Consumer Affairs Victoria who approve and maintain our status

as a not for profit organization and registered charity. Rules which are included in that document can only be changed through a process which includes a meeting of all members at a set date and time, and forwarded to CAV for approval.

Similarly our shed's premises are provided by City of Casey and various rules are contained within a nine year lease we have with Casey. Presently we are seeking to modify some of those rules in the light of our joint experience over the last 5 years. Such changes take time and negotiation by the shed and the Council.

Meeting with other sheds recently I remain confident that successful associations have more good management than luck in their on-going success.

American War of Independence



The **American Revolutionary War** (April 19, 1775 – September 3, 1783), also known as the **Revolutionary War** or **American War of Independence** or simply the **American Revolution**, was the armed conflict that comprised the final eight years of the broader American Revolution, in which American Patriot forces organized as the Continental Army and commanded by George Washington defeated the British Army. The conflict was fought in North America, the Caribbean, and the Atlantic Ocean. The war's outcome seemed uncertain for most of the war, but Washington and the Continental Army's decisive victory in the Siege of Yorktown in 1781 led King George III and the Kingdom of Great Britain to negotiate an end to the war. In 1783, in the Treaty of Paris, the British monarchy acknowledged the independence of the Thirteen Colonies, leading to the establishment of the United States as an independent and sovereign nation.

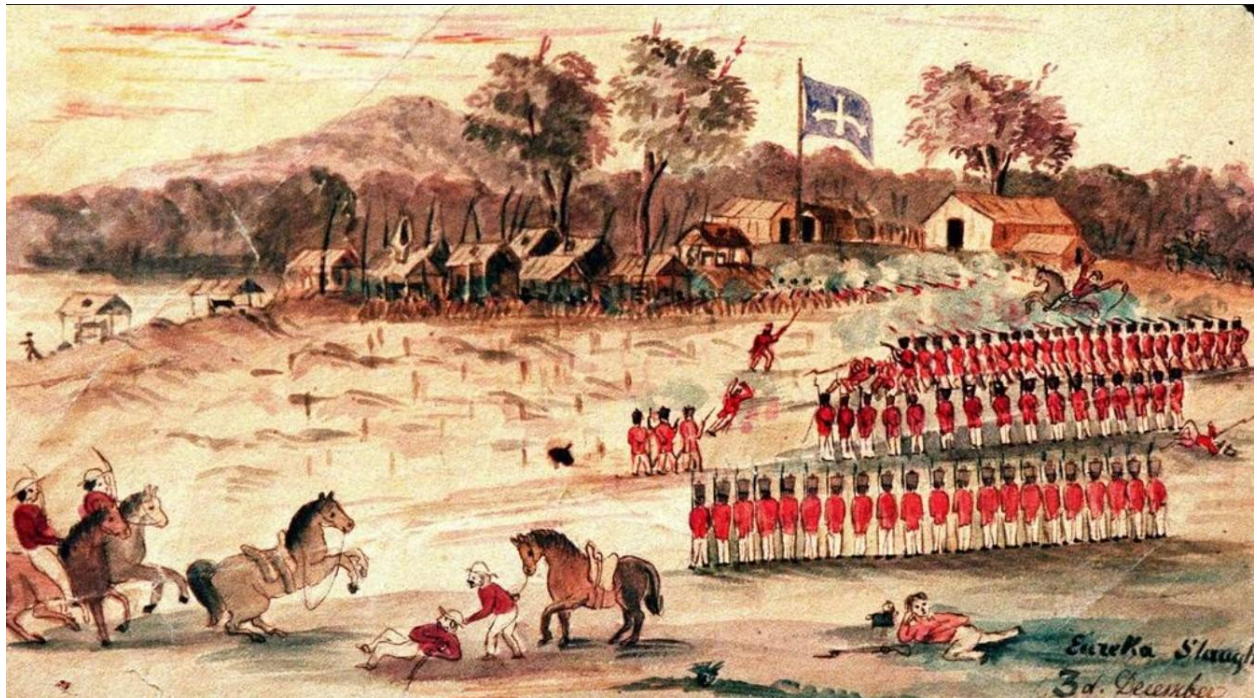
In 1763, after the British Empire gained dominance in North America following its victory over the French in the Seven Years' War, tensions and disputes began escalating between the British and the Thirteen Colonies, especially following passage of the Stamp and Townshend Acts. The British Army responded by seeking to occupy Boston militarily, leading to the Boston Massacre on March 5, 1770. In mid-1774, with tensions escalating even further between the British Army and the colonies, the British Parliament imposed the Intolerable Acts, an attempt to disarm Americans, leading to the Battles of Lexington and Concord in April 1775, the first battles of the Revolutionary War. In June 1775, the Second Continental Congress voted to incorporate colonial-based Patriot militias into a central military, the Continental Army, and unanimously appointed Washington its commander-in-chief. Two months later, in August 1775, George III declared the colonies to be in a state of rebellion. In July 1776, the Second Continental Congress formalized the war, passing the Lee Resolution on July 2, and, two days later, unanimously adopting the Declaration of Independence, on July 4.

In March 1776, in an early win for the newly-formed Continental Army under Washington's command, following a successful siege of Boston, the Continental Army successfully drove the British Army out of Boston. British commander in chief William Howe responded by launching the New York and New Jersey campaign, which resulted in Howe's capture of New York City in November. Washington responded by clandestinely crossing the Delaware River and winning small but significant victories at Trenton and Princeton.

In the summer of 1777, as Howe was poised to capture Philadelphia, the Continental Congress fled to Baltimore. In October 1777, a separate northern British force under the command of John Burgoyne was forced to surrender at Saratoga in an American victory that proved crucial in convincing France and Spain that an independent United States was a viable possibility. France signed a commercial agreement with the revolutionaries, followed by a Treaty of Alliance in February 1778. In 1779, the Sullivan Expedition undertook a scorched earth campaign against British-allied factions of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy (*also* Iroquois). Native American raids on the American frontier, however, continued to be a problem. Also, in 1779, Spain allied with France against Great Britain in the Treaty of Aranjuez, though Spain did not formally ally with the Americans.

Howe's replacement Henry Clinton intended to take the war against the Americans into the Southern Colonies. Despite some initial success, British General Cornwallis was besieged by a Franco-American army in Yorktown, Virginia, in September and October 1781. The French navy cut off Cornwallis's escape and he was forced to surrender in October. The British wars with France and Spain continued for another two years, but fighting largely ceased in North America. In the Treaty of Paris, signed on September 3,

1783, Great Britain acknowledged the sovereignty and independence of the United States, bringing the American Revolutionary War to an end. The Treaties of Versailles resolved Great Britain's conflicts with France and Spain, and forced Great Britain to cede Tobago, Senegal, and small territories in India to France, and Menorca, West Florida, and East Florida to Spain.



Views and slogans used in the American Revolutionary Wars were again present at the 1854 Battle of the Eureka Stockade. These were expressed by American miners in support of the Eureka rebels.

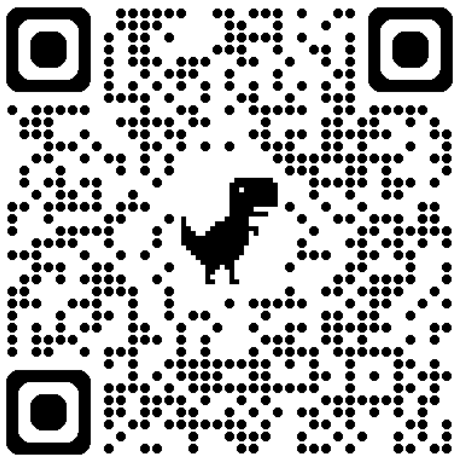
My disappointment is the controversy which ultimately became too great an obstacle for her to cope with. But in my eyes it does not diminish or tarnish

Welcome to the Second Half of 2026!

Believe it or not, and most would rather not believe it, we are past the halfway point of the year. Now next Christmas is closer than last Christmas. 2027 is closer to us than 2025. It may be time to look at goals and planning for the Christmas/New Year period. Here are some tips to keep in mind.

1. The Mid-Year Audit

- **Celebrate wins:** List 3-5 things you are proud of accomplishing since January. Acknowledge your progress before looking at what is left.
- **Review unfinished goals:** Identify goals that haven't been met. Determine if they are still relevant or need to be adjusted to fit your current reality. [[1](#), [2](#), [3](#)]

2. Streamline Your Priorities

- **Audit your time:** Track how you spend your week and eliminate or delegate non-essential tasks that drain your energy without adding value. [[1](#)]

Modeler's Corner



Apollo 11 (July 16–24, 1969) was the American spaceflight that first landed humans on the Moon, and the fifth crewed mission of NASA's Apollo program. The mission was crewed by Commander Neil Armstrong, Command Module Pilot Michael Collins, and Lunar Module Pilot Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin, all of whom were on their second and final spaceflight.

Photographed here is a 72nd scale model of the Apollo 11 Luna approach. The manufacturer of the kit is Dragon and two models are supplied in the kit, the Command Module CM-107 "*Columbia*" and the Lunar Module "*Eagle*" (LM-5). The Lunar Module has both the Decent and Accent stages. Dragon did latter versions of this kit with the Lunar Rover vehicle for later Apollo missions.

The photo was done with the Green Screen technique and was superimposed on an actual photograph of the full moon taken from my driveway.

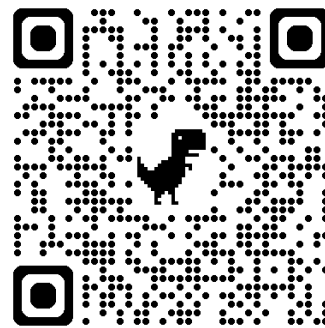


I wouldn't consider the kit an easy build, or recommend it to a beginner in the hobby. It takes a bit of experience to assemble and paint to a satisfactory standard. Given that you are bringing two models together, care must be taken in mounting the models correctly on the display stand.

Having said that, it is still an interesting subject to model and gives you an appreciation of the great achievement the Apollo Moon Landings were.

The Drive: 1950 Austin Devon



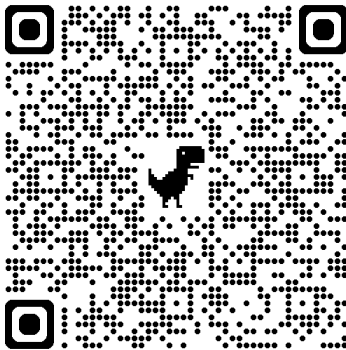
Both the Devon and Dorset were body-on-frame designs with modern bodies and a 1.2 L straight-4 OHV engine producing 40 bhp (30 kW) at 4200 rpm.^[1] They featured front coil sprung independent suspension but retained a rigid axle and semi-elliptic leaf springs at the rear. The Girling brakes with 9 in (229 mm) drums were operated hydraulically at the front and mechanically at the rear. Later cars had column operated gear change and full hydraulic braking. A sliding sunroof and heater were extra cost options on the UK market.

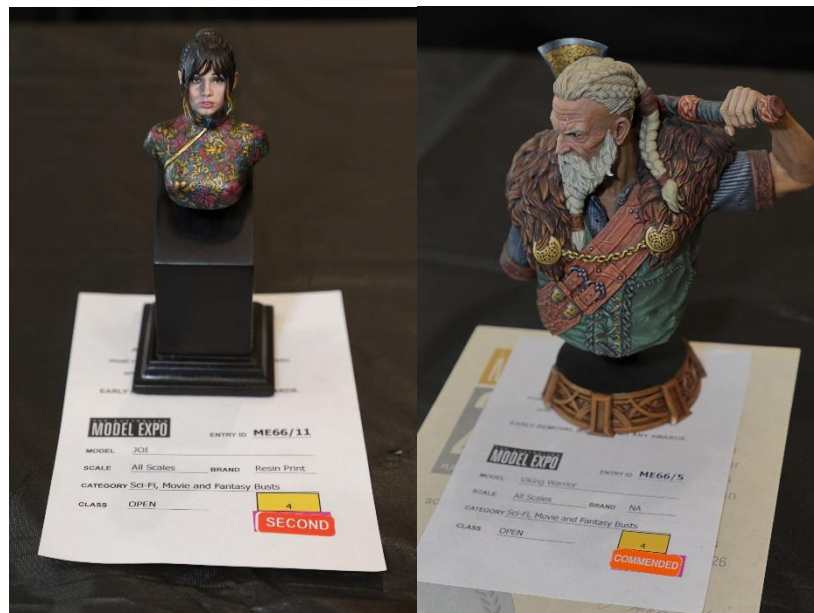

Australian Model Expo 2026 Report

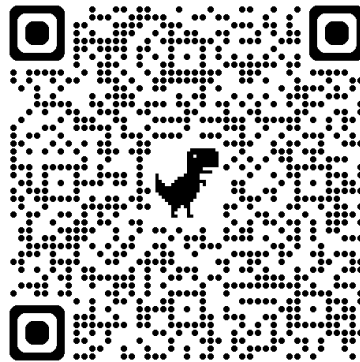

AUSTRALIAN MOTOR HERITAGE FOUNDATION™

Heritage vehicle enthusiasts spend \$1.3 billion annually on events, holidays and racing

According to the Australian Motor Heritage Foundation's (AMHF) landmark 2024 Automotive Heritage Economic Impact Survey, Australia's motoring enthusiasts pour \$1.316 billion annually into events, automotive related holidays and travel and racing— making it the equal third-largest category of spending in the sector.

As AMHF Chief Operating Officer Geoff Piggott puts it:

That \$1.3 billion isn't just passion — it's a serious contribution to Australia's economy.

And that's only part of the story.

The survey reveals a staggering \$9.9 billion total annual contribution to the Australian economy, driven by spending on such things as bodywork, parts and accessories, mechanical repairs, fuel, lubricants, insurance, registration, publications and lifestyle.

"This level of contribution is a reminder that motoring enthusiasts should not be overlooked," Piggott said.

Motoring enthusiasm also supports 42,000 direct jobs and generates \$2.8 billion in wages every year — a powerful engine for employment across the country.

We are committed to highlighting the significant economic contribution enthusiasts make to the broader Australian economy. The AMHF will be sharing this information with motoring clubs, industry, stakeholders and policymakers.
